

HORTICULTURE

COMFEY

Comfrey – *Symphytum* spp. is a native of Asia and Europe. There are 40 different species of comfrey.

The species most used in gardens is Russian Comfrey, Symphtum x uplandicum. There is a Symphytum Officinale. When you see Officinale in

a plant's Latin name it means that it is a medicinal plant. Comfrey has been around as a healing herb since 400BC. The Romans and Greeks used it to heal bones, wounds, and for bronchial ailments.

You can use it in tea and for dressing wounds. To dress a wound, take a couple of leaves and brush together to remove hairs and wrap around wound. This plant is incredibly effective in stopping bleeding and healing wounds.

The plant likes moist soil and prefers a fertile soil. The PH it likes is 6.5 to 8.5. The highest yields are from the range 6-7. This plant likes full sun but can tolerate shade also. The hardiness zone is 4-9.



Make sure if you plant comfrey that you plant it in a bed that you are not cultivating as this plant can be invasive. Plant in raised beds about 6 inches apart. You can obtain plants by cutting into the center of the crown and planting the divisions. You can also use root cuttings. The best way to use root cuttings is to put them into a container and use 50% compost and 50% river sand mix. It is best not to harvest until the second year as this will let the roots set in the soil.

As you can see, the comfrey plant has multiple uses. It must be monitored due to its spreading tendencies.

You can use this plant for mulch, feeding livestock and can be used for biomass. The comfrey plant is high in potassium. You can also eat this plant. You could use the leaves in a salad or cook it.
