

Our total membership is fifty-eight. Please continue to introduce your friends and neighbors to the club.





## **HORTICULTURE**

### **Worm Composting**

Worm composting or vermicomposting is a process where you convert garbage wastes into something the farmers call *black gold*., which is a black product produced from worm castings.

It is said that it is 5 times better than commercial fertilizers.

The worm to use is the red wiggler. The reason is this worm eats right under the mulch. Other types of worms drag their food into a burrow, and this would lead to anaerobic activity in your bin.

You can make your own worm bin. Use a plastic bin with a lid, long and wide is better than tall and narrow. Use a drill or hammer and nail to make holes on the bottom sides and lid. There are some worm bins that are manufactured, and they will cost about 100.00 Dollars or more.

To make your bedding, shred up uncoated newspaper and some soil as worms have gizzards and this helps them process the food. Make the bedding 3 to 6 inches high. Then moisten the newspaper. If you use a moisture meter, it should be in the green in the middle of the meter. If you squeeze the paper in your hand, you should only get a drop or two. The worms require moisture so you should check your bed regularly for moisture. Worms do best at temperatures ranging from 55 to 75 degrees so make sure that you have a shaded area or inside of a building.

For feeding you should use food scraps

- Melon rinds
- Roots, leaves
- Tea leaves and coffee grounds
- Egg shells

You should have a ratio of 70% brown matter to 30 percent green matter.

Put in about a 1/2 to about a pound of worms, then put your food on top of them and put sheets of paper on top of the food. Wet the paper using a mister bottle.

Check the food once a week to make sure that there is a layer there. If you can, it is better to chop up their food and shred the paper. This allows more surface area for worms to eat faster.

What not put in your worm bin:

- Salt, pepper and other spices
- Milk, dairy or dairy products
- Diseased or infested plants
- Meats, fats, bones or oils
- Cat or dog feces
- Treated wood products

#### Harvesting:

The best way to harvest the worms is to dump the bin on a table. Have a light overhead, remove the castings until the worms show. Shine the light on the worms; this will cause them to burrow into the soil. Remove soil again until worms are exposed and shine light on them.

Repeat this process until all you have is a ball of worms; then put them back in your bin.
