

GAME DAY - NOT JUST PLAYING AROUND

Another very successful Game Day has come and gone. Game Day isn't just about getting together with friends, playing games, winning raffles, and taking home crazy bargains from the Silent Auction. For our club, it's also about making money. By just about any financial standard out there, this is a very effective fund raiser.

Total Game Day receipts were \$2,689! If you were a numbers person (and I am), you'd want to know what makes up that amount.

43% - **Tickets** – Please keep selling tickets to your friends and neighbors. This was the source of the majority of receipts.

40% - **Silent Auction** – You may not want it anymore, but somebody else obviously does. Even though we didn't sell all our silent auction items, we sold a lot and made a lot! Keep cleaning out your cupboards and sending those items to the silent auction.

Special thanks to Marjorie Abbass for the condo raffle item. The bidding became heated – and our club benefited. The condo accounted for 45% of silent auction receipts and 18% of total Game Day receipts!

18% - Raffles and 50/50 – these were especially successful because Carole Baird won the money tree and kindly donated it back to the club. Thank you!

The next piece of the puzzle is "what did it cost to generate those receipts?" In terms of cash going out of our club's coffers, not much. What our club spent on food, prizes (door prize, table plants, and money tree), and location rental was only **14%** of our receipts - \$365. If we were a business, that would be incredible. It means that for every dollar our club spent, we earned \$7.37. These days, who wouldn't love an investment with that kind of return?

But that's **not the whole story**. What makes Game Day so successful for our club doesn't appear in our financial statements. There are people who do so much work behind the scenes, club members who donate food for the delicious meals we serve, and club members who donate those beautiful raffle baskets. All this is at no cost to the

club. We estimated the club would have to spend about \$500 to buy the food and raffle items that were not reimbursed. If we had to purchase these contributed items, our all-in costs would be about 30% of total receipts. Again – if we were a business, a net profit of 70%

would be phenomenal. Because of our members' dedication, hard work, and generous contributions toward expenses, we actually netted 86% - \$2,324!



It's time to think about the 2024 Spring Plant Sale. Sure it was frigid this morning, but hang tight, 4 days from now it will

be a sunny and hot 85°. Somewhere in these next few weeks you'll just feel it......time to start cuttings and plant seeds -- even if you have to protect them for a few days in the first couple of weeks.

Typical garden flowers, like marigolds and zinnias, need 40 to 45 days from planting to flower formation. Get your seeds in little pots or garden forms soon, and you'll have lots of vigorous seedlings to tempt our customers. (U of FL notes that the typical last frost for Central Florida is February 14*).

Spring is the best time for free plants. While cleaning out your beds, pot the seedlings that have sprung up under your surviving plants and shrubs. Here, for example, you will see Coleus, Bloodleaf, and Pentas - all survivor plants that will be beautiful by the time of the Plant Sale.

HORTICULTURE

The P's and Qs of plant fertilizer

The concentration of the three major nutrients in a fertilizer will be the three numbers you see somewhere on the container. For example, 20 -10-15 means that there is 20% nitrogen, 10% phosphorus and 15% potassium. Plants need a total of 14 other different elements for optimal growth but many of those are needed in very low amounts. I will save that for a future article.



Nitrogen is what makes plants grow tall and green. A plant that has more N may be taller or bigger but without a root system to accommodate that plant biomass; you will have an unhealthy plant. Nitrogen is soluble in water and will rapidly go below the root layer so it is best not to apply too much N, both because the plant will not be able to utilize it and the pollution aspects. This is a good one to 'spoon feed' a bit at a time of a lower analysis for best plant growth. Leaves that are yellow are usually a symptom of lack of N.

Phosphorus is needed for stem and root growth. Our soils in Florida have all the P that is usually needed unless if you are planting in a raised bed or in a pot where you have filled it with a potting mix. Many potting mixes have plenty of fertilizer added for initial growth. Phosphorus is a major pollution factor and should only be used when necessary. Sometimes leaves will be a purplish when deficient in P.

Potassium is also needed for stem and root growth. Here in Florida, the analysis should be at least the same as the N or more.

I won't go into detail the regulations for adding fertilizer to your turf or general landscape other than follow your area's restrictions.

In summary, look for a fertilizer that has the minor nutrients added in. Many palms are deficient in Boron and a small amount in a full fertilizer will solve the problem. There are two methods to apply your fertilizer. As a dry fertilizer that you will spread or add to your pots or as a soluble fertilizer that you will add to water. Both have advantages. Long release is a wonderful method to feed your plants. It is usually in small pellet form that you can add to your pots. Organic fertilizers are usually lower analysis (1-1-1) but can be used continuously. Compost tea is an example of this. Ph can also affect how plants take up different nutrients, but if your soil is between 6 and 7.2, you should be ok. I will conclude that you can do everything perfect and unless you are watering sufficiently, it will all be in vain. Water is your most necessary item here on our sandy soils. Increase your organic matter, and this will not only aid in holding water but also have a minor amount of fertilizer. Feel free to reach out to me if you have any questions. Jwb2@cornell.edu
